The preservation of the biosphere as a habitat for plants, animals and humans is one of the most urgent global concerns today. In the face of overexploitation and rapid urbanization, the question of man's self-image in the context of nature is being raised anew.

The Symposium "Nature as Resource, Aesthetic Experience, and Source of Danger: International Interdisciplinary Conference" will discuss the areas of tension from the perspectives of literary studies, cultural ecology, philosophy and theology, but also from the biosciences, shedding light in particular on the beginnings of the problematic developments of modernity as depicted in the poetry and visual arts of the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries. Extractivism in the Amazon biome and the legacies of the Cold War will also be addressed. Finally, philosophical approaches will be discussed that emphasize the importance of experiencing natural beauty as a sensitive way of dealing with nature.
